First Reading: Wisdom of Solomon 7:26 - 8:1

Wisdom is the brightness that shines forth from eternal light. She's a mirror that reflects God's activity; the perfect image of God's goodness. Wisdom can do anything, since Wisdom's one and undivided; never changes – and yet makes everything new.

Generation after generation, Wisdom enters souls and shapes them into God's friends and prophets. God doesn't love anything as much as people who make their homes with wisdom. Wisdom is more splendid than the sun and more wonderful than the arrangement of the stars. She's even brighter than sunlight, for night follows day but can never overcome Wisdom.

Gospel: Mark 7:1-8, 14-16, 21-23

The Pharisees and some of the religious scholars who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus. They had noticed that some of the disciples were eating with unclean hands - that is, without ritually washing them. For the Pharisees, and Jewish people in general, follow the tradition of their ancestors and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow. Moreover, they never eat anything from the Market without first sprinkling it. There are many other traditions which have been handed down to them, such as the washing of cups and pots and dishes.

So these Pharisees and religious scholars asked Jesus, "Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of our ancestors, but eat their food with unclean hands?"

Jesus answered, "How accurately Isaiah prophesied about you hypocrites when he wrote, 'These people honor me with their lips, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer is worthless; the doctrines they preach are only human precepts.' You disregard God's commandments and cling to human traditions."....

Jesus summoned the crowd again and said to them, "Listen to me, all of you, and try to understand. Nothing that enters us from the outside makes us impure; it is what comes out of us that makes us impure. If you have ears to hear, then listen."

For it is from within - from our hearts - that evil intentions emerge: promiscuity, theft, obscenity, envy, slander, pride, foolishness. All these evils come from within and make us impure.

Holy Communion The Invitation

The Purpose

Long ago, God sought to commune with us, and by choosing to live with us embodied as Jesus, God experienced all the desires and temptations that we face in our daily living as human beings. Jesus, then, first showed us how to restrain those human desires and temptations; and in calling his disciples and followers, he revealed how to spread his way of love and peace in our wide and wonderful community here on Earth.

Presenting the Elements

To remind us of the union of body and spirit, Jesus took a loaf of bread, gave thanks, broke it like we often break in our relationships with one another, and showed us the way to reconcile by asking us to share our bread with each other.

By sharing the broken bread, we participate in and become the body of Christ in the world.

In the same way, Jesus took the cup filled with the fruit of the vine, again gave thanks, and asked us to drink of the same spirit of loving-kindness and harmony that filled him.

By sharing the cup of blessing, we participate in and become the new life of Christ in the world.

What we symbolize here in this holy space, we justify by our service when we go forth from this place.
