Fourth Lesson The Night of Jesus's Birth...

The Emperor Augustus had decreed, as emperors and dictators do, that all the world should be registered so taxes and control over the marginalized could be secured. Augustus required that everyone travel to the towns where their families were from to complete the census.

Obeying the law of the emperor, Joseph took Mary to Bethlehem, because that is where his descendants had originally settled. How far was it to Bethlehem? From Nazareth it was a long and hard trip - about 120 miles, and they traveled by donkey and on foot with others who were on the same journey.

Mary was engaged to Joseph and expecting a child. While they were in Bethlehem, Mary's time arrived, and she gave birth to Jesus. It was there, in Bethlehem, that the child Jesus was born, wrapped in cloth and placed a manger because there was no room at the inn, with all those traveling to complete the emperor's order.
